Refugee Sponsorship Evening at Mountainside United Church

Rev Paula Klein, director of Montreal City Mission, organized an ecumenical information meeting at Mountainside on Wednesday evening October 14, 2015. The principal speaker, Lauren Lallemond from Action Réfugiés Montreal (ARM), led about 64 United, Unitarian and Anglican participants through a six step document to aid congregations who are looking into the sponsorship of Syrian refugees. One Child, One Chair Aid for a School in the Philippines

After Typhoon Haiyan/Yolanda struck the Philippines in November 2013, Mountainside United Church sent money to a Filipino organization to help build sturdy homes for families.



When Ester and Ramon Vicente and I visited the Philippines last winter we met with Ester's niece Betty Romero. She told us about a project she is very involved with through the local organization Lifeline

Foundation Support Team Inc. called One Child, One Chair. Estancia Central Elementary School, where more than 3000 children study, was severely damaged during the typhoon. The school has been rebuilt but needed refurbishing. We decided to help. Last spring Mountainside raised \$1000 to buy 48 chairs.

Betty wrote: Our deepest thanks to Mountainside United Church for your donation. The teachers and students at Estancia Central Elementary School are so grateful that other people from halfway around the world care about their learning conditions.

Outreach Sunday October 18, 2015



Royal Orr, Chair of the Board of Montreal City Mission (MCM), was our guest speaker for Outreach Sunday. This past August he was awarded the Sheila and Victor Goldbloom Distinguished Community Service Award for his volunteer work over the years. He has had many experiences during his communications career, including being host and producer for several years for *Spirit Connection*, an award-winning United Church program on Vision TV.

Towards the end of his talk, Royal reminded us of how Mountainside helps others through our financial support of MCM. Their day camp, Camp Cosmos, had 76 participants last summer, including 15 children with special needs who were provided with aides. Through MCM's *Just Solutions Clinic* legal advice is provided to refugees, those who face deportation and those who seek to bring their families to Canada. MCM's newly named Roger Snelling Clinic provides mobile legal service for seniors.

Building and Property Report

A leak in the ceiling late last spring at the east end of the second floor corridor near the Lansdowne stairs motivated Session to request a new roof for Leslie Hall. Work was begun mid-summer and completed a few weeks later. There were associated repairs inside, which together with general maintenance, were competently handled by Neil MacKinnon and his crew.

You may have noticed the removal of a large tree near the Roman property. This tree had been deemed unsafe. The rest of the Norwegian maples along that property were trimmed.

I take this opportunity to mention the special attention given to our building inside by Vincent Tan, and outside by Sandy Chisholm. His great work on the grounds is essential to the beauty of our church property in the summer.

Evaluation of Alternate Uses for the Mountainside Site

At the congregational meeting concerning the potential sub-division of the church property to create a new building lot and subsequent sale of that lot, held on May 25, 2014, some alternate uses of our site were suggested. Two of them were:

1. Conversion to a palliative care centre.
2. Building of a retirement home and incorporating the church building into that facility.

These options were investigated with the City of Westmount and Presbytery. As part of that investigation, at the suggestion of the City, we engaged an urban planner from Groupe BC2 to prepare an urban planning report for our property. The conclusion from these discussions and this report is that it is extremely unlikely that either of these options could succeed, for the reasons outlined below:

1. Our site is currently zoned residential with exception granted for religious use. The site also has a height restriction related to protection of views from the Roslyn lookout. It is very unlikely that Westmount would grant the rezoning necessary for either of the above two uses.
2. It is also very unlikely that Presbytery would allow the conversion to either of these uses since it has already closed the Griffith McConnell seniors' residence/nursing home.
3. Even if both those bodies agreed, the cost to convert our building would likely be well beyond our financial resources. As well, it would require substantial time and effort, also likely well beyond what our congregation could support.

Consequently, the Trustees are no longer considering either of these two alternate uses for the Mountainside site.

The sale of the property to the Montreal Korean Methodist Church was the other alternative proposed at that meeting. This option was discussed with the Montreal Korean Methodist Church who indicated that they are raising funds to build a new church, more suited to their needs, at a better location for their congregation. Therefore they are not interested in purchasing our property.

The Session has now asked Trustees to look at other redevelopment options for our site. The congregation will be kept informed as we proceed and any major changes being proposed will be presented to the congregation for approval. However, viable options are probably very limited. It will take time, effort and funding for Trustees to develop these plans to a stage where the Congregation, Presbytery and Westmount can properly evaluate their implications.

Over the first 9 months of 2015 the endowment fund has declined by \$209,000, reflecting the difficult market conditions of the past few months plus our substantial operating deficit. While the fund is still strong at over \$1.9 million, as our operating deficit continues to increase, the fund will decline at a faster and faster pace. Therefore, it is important to develop "ready for implementation plans" over the next 3 to 5 years for the future of the congregation and of our property. Otherwise, someone else will likely make the plans for us, probably with a less desirable outcome.

After more than 40 years of service to the community, the Mountainside Meals on Wheels group announced in May that they would be closing in June. It was a decision that was reluctantly made. As you will remember the MOW program closed for the first time five years ago because of the difficulty in finding volunteers to staff it.

However, a new, enthusiastic team — Judy Clark, Kay Robb, Sandra Baines and Susan Purcell — recruited new members, many from the community at large, to relaunch. It worked successfully, although always with challenges, for the past few years. Now, once again the team has run out of steam.

Many of the clients had been with Mountainside for years but they will be taken care of by New Hope and Santropol Roulant which are large government-subsidized meal services.

Susan Purcell, Coordinator, said in a letter to her volunteers, “We are so grateful to all of you for the hard work and love you put into your tasks. Thank you.” The group met for a final coffee party on June 17th.

Thanks to all of the MOW participants over the years who maintained this service on behalf of Mountainside United Church.

It was decided that the balance in the bank account of MOW, approximately \$1200, will be donated to the Syrian Relief Fund.
