## End of Year Outreach in 2015

We'd like to update Rapport readers who did not have the opportunity to read our Outreach annual report in March.

**Syrian Refugee Relief** – In 2015 Mountainside donated \$2233.44, matched by the Canadian government, to the United Church Syria Refugee Appeal to help displaced Syrians overseas. As of February 2016 the United Church of Canada received over \$900,000 to support partners responding to this crisis. A \$1000 donation was also made from Mountainside to Action Réfugiés Montréal thanks to a cheque provided by one of our members.

The United Church supports refugees who need protection regardless of religious affiliation. Read more about Mountainside's contributions locally in a separate article of this Rapport.

**The Minstrels of Hope** – These talented touring singers came to present a pre-service concert for us on Sunday, October 25th. This fundraising choir was formed to help alleviate poverty in the Philippines and empower disadvantaged people.

**Winter Coats Appeal** – In November a carload of warm winter coats, boots, hats, mitts and scarves from our congregation was delivered to McGill, for their international students.

**Christmas Appeal and White Gift Sunday** – \$2200 cheques were given to Montreal City Mission and St Columba House. A carload of gifts for distribution at Saint Columba House's annual children's Christmas party was gratefully received.

The family lives in St. Leonard. His wife, Martine, is studying and is in a job training program. The children — Jeremie, Prince, Emeraude, Aurore and Kitsia — are in local schools.

Paul thanked the members of Mountainside for all of the prayers and support that they have given him and his family over the past eight years.

### Syrian Refugee Project

In the spring of 2015 a sub-committee of Outreach was formed to look into ways that Mountainside might be involved with the Syrian refugees who would be coming to Canada. It was decided that the best course of action for our Congregation was to help another sponsor with material goods that would be needed to settle a family or individual. This would include clothing, and household items such as linens and kitchen items, and even toys for the children.

By the fall of 2015 we had connected with the Dorval Mosque who had been advertising that they were sponsoring a number of families as well as helping other sponsors with material goods. A campaign was launched and goods collected, including clothing at first and, later, linens and household items and toys.

Most of the things collected were sorted and repacked by category. We were pleased that everything was in good condition. The first load of items was delivered before Christmas and subsequently seven more carloads were delivered in the New Year. In all, we feel that this project was very successful and thank everyone who participated.

## Report from Session

Our Annual Celebration of Ministry was held on Sunday, March 6th, following Sunday Worship. Committee convenors were invited to highlight one or two items from their annual reports for which they were particularly proud or thankful. Julie Dawson, Treasurer, went over the financial statements from the financial review (formerly audit) explaining our operating deficit of \$160,000 and overall deficit of \$230,000.

Ramon Vicente was thanked for his two years as Chair and Rev. John Matheson's associate minister privileges were renewed. A motion was received from Session (see Trustees' report) regarding the possibility of looking into selling the Mountainside property. After a discussion period, the vote was unanimous to allow the Trustees to proceed with their research and commence discussions with Presbytery. We will be hearing more on this subject in the coming weeks and months.

## Trustees Report

Last Fall Session asked Trustees to look at redevelopment options for our site. The Trustees received the report on this subject on February 11, 2016. It indicated that redevelopment options for our site are very limited due to zoning restrictions and the heritage status applied to our building by Westmount. The best and only realistic option would be to sell to another religious institution since the site is already zoned for that use and there seems to be a potential buyer(s). Sale to a developer is very unlikely to succeed since a condominium project would not be financially viable. Sale of part of the land would be time-consuming, uncertain of success, and only provide a short term reprieve for our financial difficulties.

The report was reviewed during the Session meeting held later on that same day. After discussion, Session passed the following motion: **“that the Session recommend to the congregation at the Annual Meeting on March 6, 2016 that we (through the Trustees) investigate the possibility of selling the property as a whole”.**

At the March 6th meeting the congregation unanimously accepted that recommendation. The Montreal Presbytery has since granted approval for the Trustees in the first instance to sell the church building and land, conditional upon the approval of the Montreal Presbytery and on an “as is where is” basis. If the Trustees are able to arrive at a reasonable agreement with a potential buyer, it will then need to be approved at duly called special congregational meeting and subsequently be approved by Presbytery. The Trustees will keep the congregation apprised of progress as we proceed with the potential sale.

leadership for three and a half decades.


He noted that she had been “quite instrumental in having the 1959 von Beckerath (organ) moved from Queen Mary Road United Church and reinstalled and enlarged by Hellmuth Wolff et Associates at Mountainside.

That is an organ which was quite pivotal to the introduction of the Neo-Baroque organ in North America and for your part in saving it, the RCCO commends you.”

## Our Charles W. Kelsey Memorial Windows

Were you aware that stained glass artist Charles William Kelsey (1877-1975) was a Westmounter and that two of his windows are at Mountainside? Kelsey trained in England for many years in the British Arts and Crafts tradition before coming to Montreal in 1922. In Westmount he lived and worked at 136 Clondeboye, and then (1948 to 1975) at 257 Metcalfe.

Kelsey's stained glass designs can be found in over 68 churches in Canada. You can find his windows in many Westmount Anglican and United churches. Westmount Park Church has one of the largest collections it seems, including several very large and colourful windows.

Our two windows were installed in the narthex, near the present day elevator, and dedicated on 14 October, 1945 in memory of two young WW2 pilots. Flying Officer Ross Eveleigh Johnson died 15 July, 1944 and



Flight Lieutenant Jack Laffoley R.C.A.F. (John Gifford Laurence Laffoley) on 4 March, 1945.

Kelsey was especially talented at painting hands and garments, using dark brown enamel. Every one of his windows is different. He is remembered for his unique expression and attention to detail. Over 400 of his drawings and the watercolour designs for his windows, many full-sized, are archived at the McCord Museum.

Much of this information came from the Westmount Historical Association's 17 March, 2016 lecture by Rosalind Pepall, former Senior Curator of Decorative Arts at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts.

Mountainside's two beautiful windows are in need of repair. With age they have begun to "wave" — ie. buckle. Can you help us get in touch with the relatives of these two airmen? Mr. and Mrs. F. Ross Johnson family lived at 730 Lexington Avenue. Ross, their only son, attended Westmount High and McGill.
